Volunteers working with your Appalachian Trail Management Committee contributed 3,185 hours to the management and maintenance of the AT since this time last year. This season, we purchased and installed another 500 feet of locust plank bog bridging in October Mountain State Forest and in the Housatonic River Valley. We replaced the roof of Wilcox North Shelter and refurbished the roofs at Wilcox South and Upper Goose Pond Cabin. We completed these and other trail projects in addition to our regular maintenance of the footpath and monitoring of boundaries. All in all, about 75 people are involved at all levels of participation. We would like you to be involved too. Once a year is all it takes.

process (cutting and folding) are still being worked out and continue to improve.


A few leaders have been sending in trip reports of outings they've recently led, and both leaders and participants are sending in more photos than in previous years.

Computer and Web Site Committee

It has been a busy year for the Computer Committee. Behind-the-scenes technical upgrades that have consumed significant time include installing updates and then tracking down and fixing problems that arose as a result. We are in the process of migrating our email lists to new software that is significantly more powerful and easy to maintain; some lists are using the new software, but many have not yet been migrated.

Our Conservation Committee has taken over the "Conservation" section of the site and developed content, and we anticipate other Committees will follow. The Chapter has decided to make our web site the official database for all Chapter events,

and Committees will enter their event schedules directly into the web site; the data will be extracted from their entries, formatted, and sent to *AMC Outdoors* and other channels of dissemination. The change should significantly streamline our Chapter's information flow procedures and reduce redundancy, delay, and error. Programming work to support this change has begun.

The Committee has also, upon request, provided advice to the Joy St. staff in charge of developing the AMC's beleagured Outdoor Listings Trip Database (http://trips.outdoors.org).

Our Chapter web site was highlighted as a "success story" at the 2005 AMC Chapters Retreat on "communication." Over the 12 months prior to this writing, the site has served 1,867,720 hits in the process of providing 262,315 distinct page views from 89,334 separate visits (from search engine "crawlers" as well as human visitors). Conservation Committee

The Conservation Committee worked to advance AMC Club-wide conservation initiatives and formed partnerships with local organizations on conservation activities. We have 604 members from our Chapter who are now subscribed to the AMC's Conservation Action Network (CAN), a monthly email action alert that keeps our members informed about conservation issues of regional importance. One such issue is Massachusetts' proposal to set aside over 100,000 acres as large and small ecological reserves, free from logging and new motorized recreation. The State held four public meetings in the Berkshire area, and many Chapter members attended these meetings to voice their opinions about the planned reserves.

Berkshire AMC members also served as Visibility Volunteers by collecting ozone data during several hikes this summer. These data, along with those gathered by other chapter volunteers, are now being compiled to evaluate air quality throughout the Northeast. Last year's air quality data can be viewed at the

AMC's "Mountain Watch" web site, which is accessible through the new Berkshire Conservation web page (amcberkshire.org/conservation).

Locally, the Committee teamed up with EMS and Amherst Conservation Department on National Trails Day to clear invasive species from the Hitchcock Center for the Environment in Amherst. We are now preparing our list of conservation activities for 2006, so it's a great time to get involved! Please join in the conservation efforts of AMC Berkshire.

Outings Committee

There were over 200 outings in 2005, including hiking, biking, backpacking, skiing, and snowshoeing. For the first time, those outings included a monthly trail maintenance activity.

Our group of Tuesday hikers was very active again this year with their weekly trips, celebrating their sixth year of outdoor activities for those folks available during the week. Their outings continue to be predominantly hikes, but also include backpacking trips, cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, biking, and camping trips.

More effort has been placed on varying the types of outings offered, including some targeted at new members and families.

Our Monthly Coordinators have once again been the backbone of the Outings Committee. They diligently work to fill each weekend with varied and interesting activities.

We have had much support from Ian Beatty (Computer Chair), and an anonymous contributor (KG – AMC Outdoors guru), who helped design our portions of AMC Outdoors as well

as our Chapter web site. We also attempted to utilize the new AMC direct-enter web site for outings, with less than stellar success.

While most of the Monthly Coordinator positions are filled, we still have a couple of months open in 2006 and could use a hand filling them in.

An ongoing activity for the Outings Co-Chairs is to keep a current list of potential qualified leaders. We continue to work on maintaining that list.

Paddling Committee

The Paddling Committee is completing another year of successful boating trips. Our major activities include quiet water and whitewater trips for both open boats and closed boats. We also offer a number of excellent rafting trips and sea kayaking excursions.

The greatest area of growth in participation during 2005 was the quiet water program. Through the enthusiastic leadership of our coordinator Rudy Julian and our other quiet water leaders, the number of participants in this program has grown dramatically.

Our most extensive instructional effort has been aimed at helping beginning kayak paddlers work on their rolling skills. Unfortunately, the rolling sessions were canceled in 2005, as the pool we had been using is no longer available. We will, however, be able to offer a number of kayak rolling sessions during March and April of 2006 for beginning paddlers.

The Committee continues to maintain a fleet of rental boats that are stored in South Amherst. We have canoes and kayaks available for quiet water and whitewater as well as some sea kayaks and rafts. Our Committee is grateful for a Supplemental Dues Allocation grant that will help us upgrade the supply of life jackets and helmets that accompany our rental boats.

We have been publishing a paddling newsletter at the start of each paddling season, and we now also provide access to the entire season's schedule on the Berkshire AMC web site.

Trails Committee

The completely revised *Metacomet-Monadnock Trail Guide*, 10th Edition, is back in print. After two years of being out of print because of numerous changes and relocations to the Trail, the 10th Edition is now available. Profits from the sales of the Guide are donated to local area land trusts when they are purchasing sections of the trail for permanent protection.

We built a new trail shelter and composting privy in Leverett on 16 acres of land that has been donated to the Rattlesnake Gutter Trust by Hal Mosher of Shutesbury for permanent protection and a trail relocation. We had an energetic crew of six AmeriCorp young people working on the shelter for nine days last May. Their help and the donation of most of the lumber and other materials at cost from W. D. Cowles Lumber made it all possible.

The feasibility study for National Scenic Trail status is being finished and will be submitted to Congress by the end of the year. The National Park Service, with our help, is exploring a route for the proposed trail from Bay Road to the Quabbin Reservation in Belchertown and Pelham, and then returning to connect with the M-M Trail in Shutesbury and Wendell. If the Norwottuck Rail Trail is extended to Belchertown, this trail could serve as a possible connecting route from the M-M to the Quabbin, avoiding much of the remaining landowner resistance to a National Scenic Trail proposal in the Pioneer Valley. A proposed route from Long Island Sound to New Hampshire would be called the New England Trail. The M-M Trail will continue as before and we will continue to work toward protection of the existing corridor west of the Quabbin.

We agreed to donate \$5,000 to the Mt. Grace Land Conservation Trust to protect a 46 acre trailhead parcel on Gulf Road in Northfield. Mt. Grace took title to the parcel on the Crag Mountain ridge and is holding it until the Town of Northfield can raise the funds to purchase it from them. This is the Trails Committee's sixth act of land protection assistance to date, resulting in the protection of almost three miles of trail since we started this initiative.

I continued my work on a badly eroded section of the Trail in the Mt. Tom State Reservation at the junction of the Quarry Trail with a great crew of UMass students. We installed 11 more rock steps and carried more stone up the hill to be used later.

I continue my search for the right person to take over as Trails Committee Chair. I am hesitant to resign at this time without finding somebody who has the time to donate and the love for this trail I have. It is time for me to step down and find a person younger than me with new energy and ideas. I have worked to develop a committee that will assist the new Trails Chair, and I will be available to provide guidance and as much assistance as the new Chair wants.

Training and Education Committee

In September, 2005, I agreed to be nominated as the Training and Education Chair. I am very excited about serving in this volunteer role. Being new to the position, I'd love to hear from recent and longstanding members regarding the types of training opportunities that would be most beneficial to you as you explore the mountains, rivers, and trails of the Appalachian region.

The ideas I bring include developing the following training and education initiatives:

 Expand the current selection of educational and training sessions to include Leave No Trace, winter backpacking, water safety and rescue, map & compass, a train-the-trainer program, and more.

- Create a mentoring program for new leaders by pairing them with experienced leaders.
- Create an activity leader kit to post on the web, which would include trailhead talking notes, release forms, a list of approved hike leaders, a list of monthly coordinators, instructions for how to list a hike and get it posted, and equipment lists for various activities such as day hikes, 3-season overnight backpacks, and winter backpacks.
- Develop and promote a program of rewards and perks for those who volunteer their time as trainers and activity leaders, including "how to stay at AMC destination points for free or reduced cost," free books and maps, and Chapter reimbursement for training, meals, and mileage in exchange for volunteer services.

So please feel free to bend my ear with your suggestions, and together we will work on expanding the Club's educational and training opportunities.
